THE PRINCESS; or, Love at First Sight. [By Thomas Killigrew.] Cast not known. An edition in 1663 (in Killigrew's Comedies and Tragedies) lists no actors' names, no prologue, no epilogue.

Friday 29 Vere

COMMENT. The King's Company. This play appears on Herbert's list, following the entry for 26 Oct. 1661. (See William Van Lennep, "Thomas Killigrew Prepares his Plays for Production," J. Q. Adams Memorial Studies (Washington, D.C., 1948, p. 803.)

Pepys, Diary: Sir W.
